INTRODUCTION

A major goal of the Medium Term Plan is to increase the supply and effectiveness of external resources for supporting program and projects. In order to do this, relations with international and bilateral funding agencies has been intensified.

In the Caribbean, having many small Island states, the need to identify and obtain support from small non-traditional donors has been recognized. In many cases funds between \$10,000 to \$100,000 can make a significant difference between getting started or doing nothing, accelerating existing project impact or addressing short-term but high impact assistance request.

The information on each selected organization or agency is organized in the following manner to facilitate its use:

- °General objectives and nature of work
- °Program of assistance
- °Level of funding

- °Cooperating agencies/institutions
- °Application procedures and contacts

Information on the traditional donor agencies (World Bank, IDB, etc) can be found in such documents as PAHO's "Guidelines on External Financial Resources Mobilization for Health in the Region of the Americas", which is up-dated annually. Also, the Peace Corps/Eastern Caribbean just published a Small Business Resource Handbook which contains some useful information.



This guide should be viewed as a first step towards systematically preparing such information in support of national and regional offices. It will become more comprehensive and selective with the input of all offices and Headquarters.

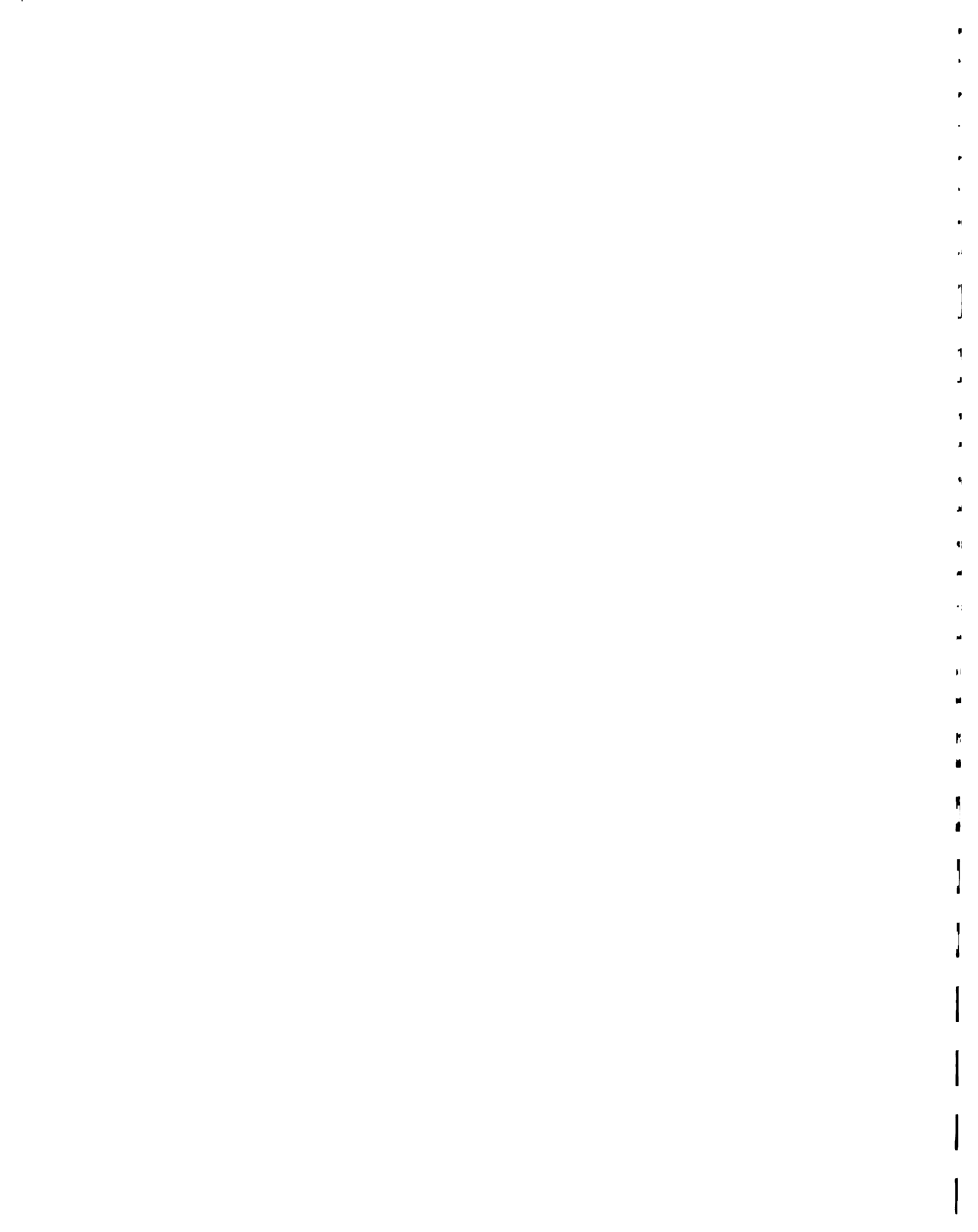

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APPLICATION PROCEDURE AND KEY CONTACTS

The ideas behind ATI's projects originate from discussions with local groups and individuals during project officers' trips abroad. ATI's rigorous project selection process begins with a concept review meeting, at which project officers meet with colleagues to present ideas for possible projects. These are screened for soundness of technology choice, potential commercial viability of the proposed enterprise, and likelihood of replication beyond the original project locale. If the concept is approved, the project officer returns to the field and formulates detailed project plan in collaboration with the local project partners. Plans include detailed technical appraisals, market analyses, and thorough assessments of the assumptions underlying expectations for project success. Staff members from ATI's Evaluation and Technical Development Group also contribute to the preparation of project plans. Following in-house scrutiny, project plans are presented formally to the Project Review and Advisory Committee (PRAC) which is comprised of outside experts from the international development and scientific communities. Based on the recommendations of this Committee, project plans are submitted by the Executive Director to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Once a project is formally approved and funds are committed, ATI staff members provide management and technical assistance on a regular basis to implement and monitor the project.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES AND NATURE OF WORK

It is a philanthropic Foundation created by Andrew Carnegie in 1911 to promote the advertisement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding. The grants must be broadly limited to the formal educational system or to educational institutions. The foundation makes it a policy to select a few areas in which to concentrate its grants over a period of years.

PROGRAM OF ASSISTANCE

The Corporation operates grant programs in four broad areas:

- 1) Education: Science, technology and the Economy.
- 2) Toward Healthy Child Development: The prevention of damage to children.
- 3) Strengthening Human Resources in Developing Countries.

Grants that do not fit easily into these categories are listed in special projects. Program 3, while Worldwide, its primary interest is the English-speaking nations of sub-Saharan Africa and of the Caribbean.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE AND KEY CONTACTS

There is no formal procedure for submitting a proposal. Anyone seeking support for a project with one of the goals stated above should submit a statement describing the project's aims, methods, personnel, and the amount of financial support required.

The officers review all proposals in the light of their knowledge of the field and in relation to the Corporation's current program priorities. They ask for supplementary information or a personal discussion when either would be helpful in making a judgement. The endorsement of the administrative head of an institution need not be sent with the initial proposal but will be requested before a favorable recommendation is made to the Corporation's trustees.

*Although agriculture is not a specialized area, food and nutrition, technical seminars, educational materials and training related to women would be considered.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES AND NATURE OF WORK

Created in 1969 as a public corporation to support self help effort of poor people in Latin America and the Caribbean. Supports local, private organizations. The Foundation's funds come from Congressional appropriations and the Social Program Trust Fund administered by IDB. It's budget for FY 1986 was about \$27 million. Many grants go to grassroots organizations such as agricultural coops, community associations and small urban enterprises. Other grants go to intermediary providing credit, technical assistance, training and marketing services to small groups and micro-producers.

\$22,009,245 grant funds approved during FY 1986. Projects funded have increased but size of grants decreased, reflecting an expanded effort to provide funding directly to local community self-help programs. In real terms, the average grant fell from \$85,000 in FY 1985 to \$65,000 in FY 1986.

Funding for Caribbean increased from \$2.3 million in FY 1985 to \$2.8 million in FY 1986.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE AND KEY CONTACTS

The Foundation selects projects for support from the large number of proposals it receives. Responding to proposals from non-governmental Latin American and Caribbean organizations, the Foundation complements local resources for self-help programs and projects that benefit and actively involve people of low incomes and few opportunities. Project activities should be sustainable beyond the period of the Foundation's grant and offer promise for contributing to the strengthening of local institutes and organizations of the poor.

The Foundation has no standard application form for its grants, but requires that the following information be provided with proposals.

°a description of the organization that would carry out the program, including its history and current activities, structure and staff, sources of financing, and relations with other institutions;

°the background of the project proposal, including its origins and objectives, and the significance of the problems it would help solve;

°a description of the activities of the project, the way in which they will be carried out, their timing, and the expected beneficiaries of the project; and

°the budget for the project, including the amount requested from the Foundation and the funds available the organization itself and from other sources.

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APPLICATION PROCEDURE AND KEY CONTACTS (cont'd)

Once the Foundation receives a proposal, and it has been field-visited by a Foundation Representative, it normally takes about three months to reach a decision on the suitability of the project for support. Once a project is approved, the Foundation enters into a formal agreement with the prospective grantee that confirms the activities to be conducted and the financial and administrative procedures to be followed. The Foundation requires financial and narrative reports on project activities every six months. In most cases, it also requires (and pays for) periodic audits by a local audit firm. Often evaluations will be arranged, and a Foundation representative will make an on-site visit no less than once a year.

Organizations interested in submitting a proposal for Foundation funding can obtain an initial reaction to their project by sending a brief letter of inquiry outlining the project's purposes, the means proposed for achieving them, and the amount of financial support required.
